



Our Shared History
Canada's Indian Residential
School System



Mandate "Kill the Indian in the child"







- 130 residential schools operated in Canada. Last school closed in 1996
- Over 1/3 of Aboriginal children in Canada attended
- 1907 report: 42% of the children in Residential Schools died before the age of 16
- By 1947: death rate was 48%

reconciliation CANADA **Assimilation**

1884 – Founding Prime Minister, Sir John A McDonald

"We must ... by slow degree educate generation after generation, until the nature of the animal almost is changed by the nature of the surroundings."

1920 – Duncan Campbell Scott, Deputy Superintendent DIA

"I want to get rid of the Indian problem until there is not a single Indian in Canada that has not been absorbed into the body politic and there is no Indian question and no Indian department."
