PUBLIC SECTOR SPENDING

The public sector collectively spends billions of dollars through procurement:

- \$200B annually with approx.
 80% taking place at local & regional level
- Represents 13% of Cdn GDP

 Every purchase has an economic, environmental and social impact


 When used strategically, our purchasing can become a tool for building healthy and resilient



SOCIAL PROCUREMENT MYTHS & FACTS

Trade agreements don't allow social procurement! Trade agreements apply but do not exclude social procurement!

Social procurement costs more!


The quality is less with social procurement! There is no evidence to support that claim!
