
There are four Ktunaxa First Nation communities (bands) located in British Columbia


Ktunaxa interacted with other First Nations through trade, social relations, sharing of resources, and at times, warfare.

Ktunaxa First Nations

- » Each KFN is governed by a Chief and Council elected by the members of the respective First Nation.
- » Terms of Chief and Council are determined by the specific community; most have staggered terms of three to four years.


